W alking through the halls of Challenger Elementary and looking into the classrooms, they are buzzing with activity. Regardless of academic level or background, students are welcomed and engaged. Teachers and staff members are working hard to bring learning alive.

The continued growth in student achievement and the ongoing efforts of the Challenger staff and teachers were recently recognized as a 2022 Building the Hope School. This honor is awarded only to schools that demonstrate strong academic achievement across multiple school years for important subgroups of students. The award also highlights the welcoming nature that is evident in the school.

Challenger exemplifies Kentwood Public Schools' commitment to excellence and equity

Challenger Elementary is an example of Kentwood Public Schools' commitment to excellence and equity across the district. Excellence and equity in education is the vision statement for Kentwood Public Schools. It is clear. It is straightforward. Yet, at the same time, it is not a simple goal.

"We have high standards at Kentwood Public Schools," said Superintendent Kevin Polston. "This has been recognized across the state and across the country. KPS schools have been named a National Blue Ribbon School, a Beating the Odds School, and a 2022 Building the Hope School. These awards do not occur by accident. They come from

intentional planning and hard work."

Polston went on to note, "Our vision statement of Excellence and Equity in Education calls for continuous improvement, to pursue ambitious goals that ensure each student is successful."

Excellence and equity are top of mind as the district embarks on a strategic planning process that began in the fall and continues



into the new year. This process will shape the district's direction over the next three to five years. With new goals and challenges, the strategic plan will help define what excellence and equity in education mean for years to come.

Strategic planning begins with gathering data to inform the process. The students, families, community members, and staff have been involved in this process. Thousands of individuals received and responded to surveys that were sent to the Kentwood community. In addition, focus groups for students, families, and staff members provided in-depth feedback regarding the district's direction.

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BOWEN ARCH SUPERHEROES

Bowen Elementary's ARCH program has been providing physical education and art enrichment throughout November and December. ARCH encourages students to have a voice and choice in programming for club days.

Some students expressed their passion for soccer and chose to organize a soccer team that meets each week during the students' choice day (Club Day). Twelve students dedicated time each week to practice their individual and team skills. At the end of the fall season, they competed in a friendly scrimmage against their fellow ARCH rivals at Challenger Elementary.

The score reflected Bowen ARCH on top, but all students demonstrated excellent sportsmanship and encouragement of each other throughout the game!

Other students had the opportunity to showcase their creativity and excellence through a variety of art projects. During one popular activity, students participated in creating their own superhero masks and imagined which superpowers they would want to have to help people in different ways. ARCH students are heroes in athletics and arts.





ARCH IS INCLUSIVE

Students in East Kentwood High School's ARCH program take equity and inclusion seriously. This fall, five representatives were elected to the Youth Advisory Board (YAB) to help plan activities and lead the afterschool program These students have implemented a few new policies to create an environment where everyone feels welcome. Each member of the YAB is responsible for checking in with newer members of the club to ensure they feel included and have activities offered that spark their interest. The YAB facilitates a restorative circle each Monday to help build a sense of community and encourage relationship building among all ARCH participants. In these circles students discuss everything from favorite Netflix series to family traditions for the holidays, and strategies to manage stress. The YAB members

also pose reflection questions at the end of each day, providing students an opportunity to give each other a compliment or shoutout. It's so great to see these youth-led initiatives making a positive difference!

SCIENTIFIC ENDEAVORS

Endeavor Elementary ARCH students have been working hard to excel in science through engagement in activities built on the scientific method. Recently, students participated in a bottle flipping experiment. The activity academically challenged the ARCH students as they learned new science-based vocabulary. Students collaborated and developed different hypotheses for how much water they would need in their bottle for optimal flipping that would help them to stick the landing. The students were then able to test their hypotheses and predictions. At the end of the experiment, students competed to see who could land the most bottle flips.



HAMILTON EARLY CHILDHOOD RECEIVES HONOR

Kentwood Public School's Early Childhood Team was recognized by the Special Education Department, receiving a Because of YOU Award for early childhood inclusion at Hamilton Early Childhood Center. A Free Appropriate Public Education in the least restrictive environment is being optimized and more preschool students are learning alongside their grade/age level peers. Through data reviews, professional learning events, and community partnerships, our team has been able to provide authentic, play-based evaluations and expand the continuum of services for special education in natural environments and regular early childhood programs.

CHALLENGER EARNS BUILDING THE HOPE AWARD

Congratulations to Challenger Elementary for being named a 2022 Building the Hope School by The Education Trust - Midwest. Challenger is one of only five schools in the state of Michigan to receive this honor.

Challenger was selected as a Building the Hope School because its Black students, students from low-income backgrounds, and English learners all demonstrated significant academic growth above the state averages in both English Language Arts and math for three consecutive years. In addition, Challenger was highlighted for its focus on data as well as the supportive and welcoming relationships the staff foster for students and parents. The school's principal, Teressa Gatza, also sets the tone with her energy, excitement, and enthusiasm she has in leading the school. Of the five schools in Michigan to receive this honor, Challenger is the only one to be recognized for outstanding achievement with three important subgroups of students.

Principal Gatza sighted two main areas for the school's success: a focus on creating a positive, caring culture for students and staff and a focus on excellence when it comes to instruction and student learning. "We have a mindset at Challenger," Gatza says, "that all students are our students. We work hard to create a genuine warm and caring environment for our students so that they feel safe and welcome in our school. This is their building, and we are here for them." She adds that, once a positive culture is firmly established, then true academic excellence is possible. "We set high learning expectations for each of our students," Gatza says. "We teach grade level standards using our district's curriculum and instructional model. We understand the importance of academic discussions in the classroom, even for our youngest students. And we use data to help us understand what is going well and what needs more attention."

The Education Trust Midwest, who presents this award, works to close gaps in opportunity and achievement for all children,

but particularly for those students who are from low-income backgrounds or who are students of color. Jen DeNeal, the organization's director of policy and research, stresses how much there is to learn from Challenger and the other Building the Hope Schools and their educators, stating, "Their successful prepandemic strategies can provide a roadmap, particularly as schools work to help our most underserved students who were impacted during Covid-19, recover from the pandemic."

This is the second year in a row a Kentwood school has received this honor. Last year Discovery Elementary was named a Building the Hope School.

GLENWOOD GRANDPARENTS HAVE SECRET POWERS

Grandparents carry secret powers that cannot be matched by anyone else! They are able to quiet a room with a glance, soothe teary, wet eyes, and share stories that capture the wiggliest of children. But not every child is lucky enough to know their grandparent, due to loss or strained relationships. For many of our multilingual families, these loved ones are still in other countries.

In the fall, Glenwood had the joy of "Granny K", a foster grandparent from Senior Neighbors, join Mrs. Campbell's 1st grade classroom. Every day Ms. K works in small groups, offers one-on-one support to students, and stops student behaviors in their tracks in a way that only a grandma can do. When Glenwood's KSSN coordinator, Maddie Rhoades, started the school's partnership with Senior Neighbors, she advocated for grandparents who were representative of the Glenwood students. Upon brainstorming with Senior Neighbors, two "Grandpas" from the Senior Refugee program were recruited to be the first ever Refugee Foster Grandparents from the organization. In January, "Grandpa Francios", whose first language is Swahili, and "Grandpa Menyo", who speaks Kinyarwanda, both originally from the Democratic Republic of Congo, will be joining the Glenwood team!



Welcoming elders or "Grandparents" at Glenwood who are representative of our students builds equity — another one of the Grandparent secret powers. Students can converse in their first language with their classroom "Grandpa" and recognize that being multilingual is a strength, not a deficit. They may catch a glimpse of their own grandparents in the faces of their foster grandparents, hear familiar phrases spoken at home, and share food and other cultural traditions. This partnership creates a better understanding of the many ways our families come to Kentwood, and it builds multigenerational relationships where histories are learned and shared with bright futures imagined for decades to come.

EXCELLENCE AT PINEWOOD

Pinewood students continue to demonstrate excellence as we reach the end of the second marking period. This semester, many students have qualified for a spot on the Pinewood Honor Roll. 408 students earned a 3.0 GPA or higher, 282 students earned a 3.5 GPA or higher, and 63 students earned a perfect 4.0 GPA. Each marking period, honor roll students receive a lunchtime treat and their names are posted in the guidance office.

Three times a year we hold Operation Target which encourages and challenges students to improve their academic performance and increase learning. There are two ways to participate: students can either sign a contract with their teacher in any class in which the student wants to improve one full letter grade OR the student earns all A's in all of their classes. Students who meet these goals are invited to a pizza party during their lunch hour. So far this year we are pleased to announce that 110 students have qualified for this honor.

Each month, students from all grade levels are nominated for a Falcon Award by their teachers. Students earn this prestigious award by leading by example and modeling our T.E.A.M. expectations of being Teachable, Empowered, Accepting and Motivated. Each winner receives a certificate of recognition and t-shirt.

We are so very proud of our students at Pinewood. Keep up the excellent work and Go Falcons!!
