STRONG SCHOOLS

In early December the Kentwood Public School Board of Education approved a request to voters on a sinking fund ballot proposal. Prior to February voting, we wish to provide you with an update regarding the important priorities that led to this request. Sinking fund revenues can be used for key areas such as school safety, technology, and functional facilities helping KPS create strong schools.

As you vote, please consider these three items:

SAFETY:

Our top priority is the safety of our students, teachers, and staff. To ensure a safe educational environment, the district must continue to monitor and enhance our safety and security measures.

- New safety and security tools are constantly being developed which help KPS protect our students and staff.
- Feeling safe frees students, teachers, and staff to focus on learning and excellence and equity in education.
- Community members can engage in programs at our facilities knowing they are safe, whether swimming in our pools, using collaboration centers, or cheering on our athletes.

Looking back, we have many reasons to celebrate. Over the summer, the district launched a pilot program of summer learning labs, bringing hands-on, experiential learning to our students. Other accomplishments include carrying on long standing traditions in Kentwood Public Schools, the annual “Stuff the Bus” food drive in November, and swimming with Santa at the East Kentwood Aquatic Center in December. These events highlight the bedrock support of our community and the partnership we value with the families of Kentwood.

“Our key to success is partnering with our community to achieve our shared vision of Excellence and Equity in Education,” says Superintendent Kevin Polston. “Every recognition our schools, staff, or students receive is a result of the work of many individuals. What makes Kentwood special is the intentional effort to build meaningful relationships to serve our community. Excellence is a byproduct of the exceptional daily work by our staff and students which, over time, leads to extraordinary results!”

As Kentwood Public Schools begins looking ahead to the second half of the year, there are exciting new projects on the horizon. These include the completion of the new Early Childhood Center next to Townline Elementary, scheduled to open for students in August. Our students will continue to compete and add to their legacy in nationally recognized programs like the We the People Competition in mid-January, and Red Storm Robotics with competitions in March and April. In March, work begins on the extensive renovation of the Hamilton building which will become the district’s 11th elementary school.

In addition to these large projects, important work takes place in our classrooms each day by dedicated teachers and staff, building relationships with their students, supporting them, challenging them, and helping them grow academically, socially, and emotionally.

The combination of the caring KPS staff, making intentional instructional choices to bring innovative and meaningful learning experiences to students, along with the steadfast support of families and community members, is the foundation of our district’s success. “We are so thankful for the continued support of our community that has created the conditions for successes across the district,” states Superintendent Polston. “Kentwood Public Schools is a destination district, and we aspire to continue to soar to new heights!”

SAFE, WARM, AND DRY: BOARD VOTES TO RENEW SINKING FUND

Kentwood Public Schools is putting forth a new building and site sinking fund proposal on the ballot for voter consideration in February 2024. Sinking Funds help districts maintain buildings, upgrade technology, fix boilers, and repair roofs. They are the support system that helps students stay safe, warm, and dry. Since the mid 1990's our district, along with many districts across the state, have benefitted from these types of initiative. The fund will not increase current taxes.

Our most recent sinking fund proposal was passed in 2015 and runs for 10 years. The millage for that vote is 1.5718. If passed, the new sinking fund proposal would also be for 1.5718 mills and would go into effect in 2026 for the next 10 years.

Election Day is February 27, 2024, with the polls open from 7:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m. Absentee ballots are available January 18, 2024, with multiple drop-off sites located in the city.

What an amazing year it's been at East Kentwood Freshman Campus! We kicked off the year with a New Falcon Camp. Our incoming freshmen came to the building for a day of team building with their new classmates. We had a great day of learning together and our incoming students built some lasting friendships. In the spring, we will welcome our rising freshmen at our Family Night - Orientation on February 27, 2024 and hope to take New Falcon Camp to the next level for the class of 2028.

This year we are recognizing our scholars for demonstrating Falcon P.R.I.D.E. (Preparedness - Respect - Integrity - Dependability - Effort). Students have received recognition throughout the fall months for perfect attendance (September), zero tardies (October), and exemplary behavior (November). We also recognize our students through activities (5th Quarter), a social mixer for students who are meeting academic, behavior, and attendance expectations. We also partner with Western Regional Community Consortium to send students to Western Michigan University to learn about opportunities in health careers. Scholars will partner with college student mentors pursuing health careers to learn about potential opportunities. Our scholars find the program is relevant and eye-opening each year we participate.

KPS FOCUSES ON STUDENT HEALTH

The safety, health, and well-being of our students is the top priority of Kentwood Public Schools. In the district's newly implemented Strategic Plan for Excellence and Equity in Education, adopted by the board of education in the spring, Whole-Child Environments is one of four key goal areas. The district is committed to upholding a standard of excellence for school climate and environment, knowing how critical this is for student learning.

Looking back to three years ago, Kentwood Public Schools had only one nurse on staff for the entire district. That has changed. Today, through a valued partnership with Corewell Health, there are four full-time RN's on staff at KPS. There are seven health aides now on the team, as well. In addition, there are ten other health aides to support students receiving special education services in the district.



Executive Director of Student Services, Veronica Lake, explains that this larger team can now more effectively and efficiently take care of students' health needs, coordinating with their physicians, and ensuring that the students are able to be in school and actively participating in their learning.

One of Kentwood Public Schools' student vision statements is: "I know we all belong and are valued." The district is committed to making sure all students feel this. "We're not just simply saying you belong," says Lake. "We're saying you belong here so much that we are going to make the connections and put the supports and conditions in place for each student to be as successful as they can be when they are in school."

Looking ahead, Lake is excited about opportunities to work with more community partners to continue to build environments and services to best support our students.

SHARED EXPERIENCES AT CHALLENGER


