It Starts with Relationships



WHOLE- CHILD

Just down the hall from Beck's room, students in Fathiya Mohamed's second grade classroom are busy taking part in a circle. They gather on the floor, sharing greetings with each other, and intently listening as each student answers a thought-provoking question. Circles are part of Restorative Practices, a larger initiative the district began last year, aimed at building community and also helping those who experience conflict rebuild trust.

In addition to Restorative Practices, Capturing Kids' Hearts (CKH) is a long-time program embraced by staff at Kentwood Public Schools. CKH also promotes a strong community, with students and staff working together to create a positive atmosphere for learning. Kentwood Public Schools consistently has several buildings named as Capturing Kids' Hearts National Showcase Schools because of the dedication our staff has for building positive relationships.

Finally, Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) is a system implemented in all schools to promote and reward positive behavior choices by students. This, along with the other initiatives mentioned, are important components in meeting one of the goals of the district's strategic plan- creating whole-child environments for students.

While plaving a big role in students' academic success, building relationships also impacts safety and security in the district Jason Russell, CED of Secure Education Consultants, a national firm based in Grand Rapids that supports schools in safety and security stresses the important role building positive relationships plays in keeping schools safe. "One of the things that has always impressed me about Kentwood Public Schools is the focus that is put on building strong relationships at all levels. Russell says. "A focus on relationships will truly prevent a lot of bad things from happening in schools."

This intentional focus on relational best practices, along with hellos, high-fives, and hugs in the morning and throughout the day, help to make Kentwood Public Schools a warm and welcoming place for each and every student, creating whole-child environments so crucial for student success.

The new Hamilton Elementary School will be the eleventh elementary school in the district. Kentwood is one of only three echoni districts in Kent County to show an increase in student enrollment, having the second highest percentage of increase during the past ten years. Enrollment will continue to expand as more homes are being built in our community, and even more are planned for the near future. The new school will have a dedicated space for an early childhood center to continue at the site, in addition to the new early childhood center under construction near Townline Elementary. District leaders will soon reach out to students, families, staff, and community members to get input on the many details that go into building and opening a new elementary school. The new Hamilton Elementary is tentatively set to open in the fall of 2025.

The Indoor Multipurpose Building will be constructed on the East Kentwood High School campus. It will include a large indoor field and track around the field that will be utilized in many ways. Sports teams, the marching band, fine arts groups and physical education classes will all be able to practice in the space. The indoor track will also be open to use by community nbers who are looking for a warm place to walk or run on those cold Michigan winter days!



The projects are funded through the 2021 bond proposal approved by the Kentwood community. "We are thankful to our community for their ongoing support of KPS," commented Superintendent Kevin Polston, "Stewardship of resources is a core value of KPS, and we take great pride in providing high-quality school facilities for our students and community. Our next projects will continue to provide exceptional learning environments for our students and community assets open and accessible for the entire Kentwood community

Both projects are in the earliest stages of design. More details will be shared with you as plans develop in the coming months.

Our approach to innovation

- When posed the question to families / staff the concept of a new & innovative model that incorporates relevant learning was clear.
 - Traditional learning model was an option, but was ranked low by both families and staff.
- Rather than investing time and resources inventing a model it makes sense to explore a model with a track record of success.
- We also heard from stakeholders that this new model should be accessible to all - not serve as a magnet school option.

Exploring International Baccalaureate (IB)

- International Baccalaureate (IB) first formed in Geneva, Switzerland in 1968.
- Original intent was to provide children of diplomats a well-balanced education that could easily transfer anywhere.
- IB exists across over 5,700 schools in 160 countries - serving 1.95 million children ages 3 to 19.
- Michigan has 91 programs in 72 public and private schools - including some of the highest performing statewide.

Priorities for new attendance zones

- With the opening of Hamilton, we also need to update our elementary attendance zones (i.e. how we slice the pie).
- Fall stakeholder engagement asked students, families and staff what priorities we should use in making these decisions.

Priorities for elementary attendance zones

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- 1. Neighborhood schools: Students live close to their school.
- 2. **Population balance and projected enrollment growth:** Balancing school size among all schools and considering future growth.
- 3. Socioeconomic diversity: Ensuring diversity across each building.
- 4. **Infrastructure and geography:** Taking into account major roads, development, and transportation routes.

Note on draft elementary attendance zones

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- Attendance zones are meant for the long term (i.e. 10+ years)
- We attempted to balance neighborhood schools, socio-economic diversity & population balance.
- In certain areas of our district these are competing concepts.

Considerations in how we move forward...

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- Revising attendance zones is **not** as **easy** as **coloring** in a **map**.
- In addition to the factors outlined previously there are other considerations that must be accounted for in revising our zones.



Considerations in **how** we move forward...

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- Legacy students allowing certain students to finish their elementary experience.
- Student transfer policies addressing Within District Transfers (WDT) and Schools of Choice (SoC) policies.
- 3. **Special programming locations** reviewing self-contained special education classrooms and PEAKS (Advanced Learning) locations.
